

One in four Americans aged 65+ falls each year.1 Seniors with dementia fall an average of 4 times per year and often can't tell you what happened.<sup>2</sup> And falling once doubles the chances of falling again.3 Add that we've seen a 20% increase in falls with the COVID-19 shelter-in-place initiatives,4 and it's no question that falls are a significant issue for families across the country. Many are considering safer care alternatives for their loved ones, including a move to a senior living community.

# Found your loved one on the ground and felt helpless?

Mom is on the ground, but you aren't sure how long she's been there. Or Dad was found and can't tell you how, why, or even where he fell. 94% of falls are unwitnessed.<sup>5</sup>

SafelyYou helps remove the unknown. Through our technology, we're able to turn these unwitnessed falls into opportunities to learn how, why, where, and when the fall happened and prevent future falls. SafelyYou utilizes cutting-edge artificial intelligence-enabled cameras to detect falls with unprecedented accuracy. Video is recorded only when a fall is detected and care staff in the community are notified to assist immediately.

But it doesn't end there. Since video of the fall is available, subsequent fall review provides caregivers the opportunity to understand the cause of the fall and put measures in place to avoid the same type of fall from occurring. We've seen that in 30% of falls, the resident moves from the original fall location.<sup>6</sup> By having the video, the community is able to get to the root cause immediately. Fall prevention measures could be as simple as providing easy access to the TV remote, but could be a larger issue, caused by timing of medications, for example.

Today, this proven program is successfully deployed in senior living communities across the country. Results have shown 40% fewer falls with SafelyYou in place.<sup>7</sup>



# Visited the ER following a fall?

Your loved one is complaining of pain following a fall or the fall scene indicates an injury could have occured, so to be safe, you head to the ER. Every 11 seconds, an older adult is treated in the ER for a fall.<sup>8</sup>

With the video that SafelyYou provides following falls, care staff in senior living communities can determine if the resident hit their head, or had another serious injury, worthy of an EMS call or ER visit. The system is specifically designed for residents in memory care who often can't tell us what happened to determine if an injury occurred that might not be initially visible.

In fact, we've seen instances where EMS, when called to assess the resident, asked to review the SafelyYou video to determine that an ER visit was not necessary following the resident evaluation and video review.

In these uncertain times, when an ER visit could risk critical COVID-19 exposure, staying out of the ER is even more important. Our studies in communities now using SafelyYou have actually shown 80% fewer ER visits from falls.<sup>9</sup>

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# Falls costing you a lot of money?

Many are surprised at the bills following treatment for a parent's fall, injured or not. Each year about \$50 billion is spent on medical costs related to fall injuries, and Medicare and Medicaid only cover about 75% of these costs.<sup>10</sup>

Moving a loved one into a senior living community is a significant decision for many reasons, including financial. Budget management is certainly a concern when considering ongoing care and a move into a senior living community. Unexpected costs are challenging.

Families are most often still responsible for outside costs, such as a visit to the ER, even when under the care of a senior living community. When a community experiences an 80% reduction of ER visits with SafelyYou, that is cost savings passed along to you.

## Unsettled leaving your parent alone?



Giving your parent access to on-site, consistent care, and even licensed medical staff, at a senior living community can certainly help put your mind at ease. But even assisted living communities and skilled nursing facilities can't monitor your loved one 24/7. An unwitnessed fall can still happen, leaving your loved one on the ground, potentially for hours before staff makes the rounds to check in.
